June Redevelopment Commission Meeting

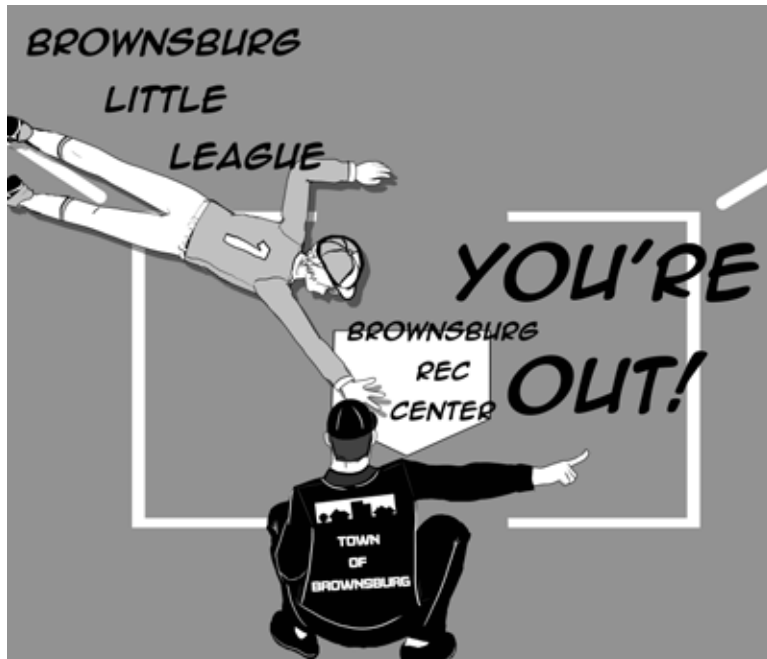
The only item of business on the agenda was Resolution #2016-03RDC - A Resolution Of The Town Of Brownsburg Redevelopment Commission Regarding the Determination of the Amount of Incremental Assessed Value in the Town of Brownsburg Allocation Areas Needed to Pay Obligations of the Commission and Necessary For Other Purposes to Be Undertaken by the Commission. Mr. Kleinhenz spoke to the resolution which was to reduce the TIF pass through amount from 14 million to 8.3 million dollars. This reduction was needed due to the mixed use development projects that the town is undertaking with the dollars being used to fund capital improvements in the downtown area to facilitate the other projects coming up in those areas. Mr. Kleinhenz stated that he has met with the schools, Fire Territory and the Library to discuss the change and answer any concerns. The resolution was approved by the commission.

Under the topic of consider such Other Matters that May Come Before the Redevelopment Commission, Mr. Kleinhenz started this section with a brief update on the term sheets that was being worked on to be taken out to the developers for the downtown area. He had met with three of four developers and stated that they are moving forward with designs even though paperwork has not been signed. It was looking like all four of the developers would break ground in October after fall baseball was over. They have between 180 and 250 day construction periods which fits perfectly with the town road projects timelines. By spring of 2018, the town will have a lot of new value and a new look to the downtown area. *(Article continues top right)*



record of recent conversations with the Town Manager or "staff". (You're OUT!! Discussion begins here -ed.) -- Mr. Austin inquired if the town had reached out to the baseball organization informing them when the change was coming. Mr. Kleinhenz stated that the town has told them that this year is the last year for those baseball fields. Mr. Austin asked for a timeline of discussions to be provided to the RDC so they could talk to the communication. Mr. Keinhantz stated he had told them and the council has backed him up that the town will provide a financial incentive for the move but no agreement has been made on the amount. The RDC commented that baseball parents still are surprised when they are told of the move. Mr. Kleinhenz stated that he knew "they had talked about building new fields but frankly it is time for them to start looking at using other fields that already exist in the community for maybe one year as they try to figure out what is going on. There are a lot of baseball fields around Brownsburg that could be used I am sure the schools would be willing to partner I love baseball I don't want 1000 parents or children thinking we are kicking them out but it is time to move into the next phase for that area." Mr. Simpson stated that for the first time he had heard that within the next two weeks they will know



where fall ball will be held. Mr. Kleinhenz stated "They have fairly grand plans they have some sponsors and kind of a financial backer I wish them luck and I hope it does work out I think it will be fantastic and the town like I said have committed we are be in the project for some amount of money It won't be a million dollars or near what they want but it will be a good sum that will allow for the construction of at least several new baseball diamonds." -- *The Editor*

Investigation into Brownsburg Little League Relocation

After hearing Troy Austin raise concerns regarding the uncertain nature of the Brownsburg Little League's next home, this publication immediately began to ask questions. We first reached out to Troy Austin asking what information he had received from Town Manager Grant Kleinhenz following his inquiry at the June RDC Meeting. To date multiple emails have been exchanged resulting in little useful information. At nearly the same time, members of the Brownsburg Little League leadership staff, and members of their relocation committee reached out to this publication for clarification of various rumors and hearsay circulating on the topic, as despite what Mr. Kleinhenz said during the RDC the BLL leadership had no

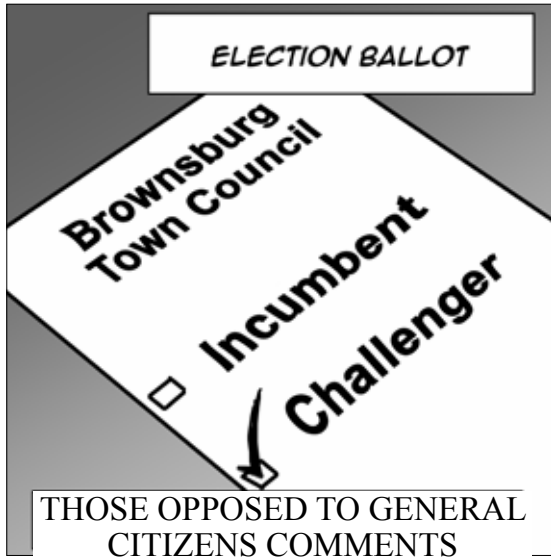

Ashley Bascu – Still no response to multiple requests to gain insight into her vote cast Feb 27, to discontinue public comments. It is unfortunate she places so little value performing her duties as town council president. She disgraces herself, and sets a poor standard for all members of the town council, various board and commissions to follow. A reasonable person does not have to look far to find the root cause for dysfunctional town governance. Leadership or the lack there of, starts at the top.

No tangible actions taken to date by the town council to 100% restore public comments. The phrase “We’re working on it” has outlived its usefulness. As very little legal effort is required to rescind the ordinance curtailing the public’s right. This leads a reasonable person to conclude all members of the town council, despite public and private notions to the contrary, see no reason to establish a timeline for their restoration. Such a position disgraces each and every one of them, and shows how little value hearing from the people who elected each of them to serve.

Financing of waste water treatment plant –using an appropriate proportion of the 6 million dollars of “unallocated funds” the town manager recently said were potentially available; even if doing so delayed construction of his pet project the Brownsburg Parks Recreation Center. As without this key piece of infrastructure in place ALL OTHER items on the town’s “want list” grind to a halt.

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Kudos to the Brownsburg Police Department from the “beat cop” to Chief Dove’s executive staff, they handled an alleged sibling murder, robbery at CVS, multiple deployments of the Emergency Response Team vehicle and mobile command center (who nay sayers proclaimed they were both an unjustified expense and would never be used. Those voices have since fallen silent) and most recently the apprehension of a potential terrorist suspect prior to his ability to receive training much less act in a manner to harm the public. Sources tell this publication all members of Brownsburg Police Department were recognized by various law enforcement partners for serving with distinction and professionalism well beyond the relative small size of our town. This is an example where leadership at multiple levels of an organization shines through.

John Gootee’s letter to the town council shows what little understanding he has for Nate Mantlo speech given on May 26th. Nate never represented himself as speaking for the entire Brown Township Board. Furthermore, Mr. Gootee’s letter demonstrates how little he understands his position as chairman, and its interworking’s with processes of governance. The fact that Mr. Mantlo was appointed by precinct committee vs. election in no way diminishes his duty and authority of office. Using Mr. Gootee’s logic, both Ashely Hobbs (at that time) and Sean Benham were caucused into office, did that in any way reduce their scope of responsibilities or ability to act? This publication offers **Mr. Gootee** a new axiom to live by “**Better to remain silent and be thought a fool than to speak out and remove all doubt.**”

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June Town Council Highlights - *The Editor*

June 9th Town Council Meeting:

Dennis Dawes opened the meeting noting that Ms. Bascu was absent that evening. Nobody came up for citizen's comments so Mr. Dawes moved on to Consent items which were approved. There was one bid approval for the North Green Street Gateway Project - Phase III (connecting trail under I-74 to Crew Car Wash and Whittington Drive). This will be the last phase for the project to give pedestrian access between the North and South side of I-74. The town received three qualifying bids, the low bid came from Reith-Riley Construction in the amount of approximately \$827,000. The bid was \$53,000 below the engineers estimate. They think they can get it done this summer to open in the fall. The bid included the extension of the sidewalk down Whittington drive and landscaping around the interstate. The bid was approved 3-1.

This evening included a report from Dr. Jim Snapp from the Brownsburg Schools. He came to share the results from 6 months of community engagement meetings. The meetings were well attended with 230 people attending all or some of the meetings. The new plan will not increase taxes in Brown Township, Lincoln Township or Brownsburg with 40% of home owners and all businesses seeing a decrease and no homeowner will see an increase. This plan also allows about a million dollars of tax revenues to be available for other taxing entities like the library, fire territory and the town. How can the school system do this now? They refinanced debt with a savings of about 13 million dollars, they have paid more mortgage payments since the referendum paying down debt and the growing assessed value of the town has increased the amount of money they are allotted. The School is holding a Public Hearing on the plan on July 18th at 6:30 at the administration building.

Next up was Jeff Smallwood from the B&O Trail Association with a Thank You to the town for supporting the 24th annual B&O Trail ride held June 4th. It was a rainy day but they still had good participation.

First up for old business was Ordinance #2016-10 – An Ordinance Annexing Real Estate into the Town of Brownsburg, Hendricks County, Indiana Pursuant to a Petition for Voluntary Annexation (616 S. Green Street) – Proposed 3rd Reading and Final Adoption (Brian Hartsell) This was approved without much discussion.

The second item was Ordinance #2016-12 - An Ordinance of the Town Council of the Town of Brownsburg, Indiana Amending Title III, Chapter 34, Sections 34.075, 34.076, and 34.077 of the Brownsburg Town Code - Proposed 2nd, 3rd Reading and Final Adoption (Phil Parnin). This was discussed at the last meeting and it gives the Park Board the ability to split their fund so they can account for revenues from their different programs better. This was approved.

Under new for consideration was Ordinance #2016-13 - An Ordinance to Amend the Official Zoning Map of the Town Of Brownsburg, Hendricks County, Indiana for Certain Real Estate Located at 213 N. Green St. - Proposed 1st Reading (Todd Barker) This was approved on first reading.

Next was Ordinance #2016-14 – An Ordinance of the Town Council of the Town of Brownsburg, Indiana Amending Title IX Chapter 92, Sections 92.060, 92.061, 92.062, 92.063 and Chapter 93, Section

93.52 of the Brownsburg Town Code – Proposed 1st Reading (Brian Hartsell) This is an update of the fireworks portion of the ordinance to match changes in state code. This was approved.

During Town Council comments Brian Jessen read into the record a letter from John Gootee Chairman of the Brown Township Board. The letter read:

"Members of the Brownsburg Town Council it has come to my attention of the Brown Township Board that Nate Mantlo attended a recent meeting of the Brownsburg Town Council and has at least implied that he was speaking on behalf of the Brown Township Trustee and/or the Brown Township Board. The Township and the Board believe that it was appropriate to notify you that while Nate Mantlo was an appointed member of the 3 member Township Board appointed by precinct committeemen and not elected by registered voters of Brown Township. That neither the Board nor the Township has taken any official position on any issue that was discussed or raised by Nate Mantlo at your meeting dated May 26th, 2016. If the Township does take an official position Tom Kmetz the Brownsburg Trustee will speak to you directly on behalf of the township. Nate Mantlo as a resident of Brownsburg has the right to speak his personal mind on his feelings on this issue but has not been authorized to speak on behalf of Brown Township either expressly or implied. Sincerely, John Gootee"

June 23rd Town Council Meeting:

The meeting was opened by Ms. Bascu. She noted that only three members were present with Councilman Benham and Jessen absent.

Citizen's Comments brought Tom Lacy to the podium. He addressed the Wastewater Treatment plant discussion and asked the Town Council to table any decisions on the wastewater facility for the evening since two town council members were absent and to give time for more public meetings to be held.

Next up were the Police and Fire Department reports. Chief Mike Dove came to the podium first with the Police Department report. He noted that since his last report the Emergency Response Team had been activated twice. On one of those occasions the APC was used when shots were fired within a residence. The incidence ended with no one hurt. The department is also assisting Plainfield with their on-going federal investigation. There was an armed robbery at CVS where guns were displayed. As of this date, no one had been arrested but they had some good leads. You can go to Facebook Brownsburg Crime Tips to see pictures of the wanted men in Brownsburg. The possible homicide from May was ruled a death by natural causes. The homicide this month already had an arrest by the date of this meeting. The department also arrested another Heroin dealer this month and was pleased that the Avon Police Department has joined the drug task force. Our police department conducted a joint investigation with the FBI over the last year that led to the arrest of a Brownsburg Teen on attempting to join ISIS. This investigation was started by Brownsburg contacting the FBI and is the first arrest of this type in the southern district of Indiana. *cont to p. 4*

Next up was Chief Larry Alcorn from the Fire Territory. He commented on the roof collapse at Brownsburg Baptist where his team is assisting with insurance adjusters to understand what happened. He also stated that all signatures were in place for the new tower at the Fire Station on 1000 North but he had been contacted by the 911 board that they were now looking at a site near Airport Rd and Hornaday which would give more coverage.

Last up under department reports was Greg Anderson for Economic Development. He noted the 23 different leads and 11 prospects have been identified since the first of the year. These prospects good bring as many as 322 new jobs to Brownsburg and 35 million in assessed value. Unemployment was down to 3.8% in Brownsburg this year. In 2005, Brownsburg had 9300 jobs and in 2016 Brownsburg has 13100 positions in the labor force. Capital investment for the year is at 162 million with 9 ground breakings and 12 ribbon cuttings since the first of the year.

First for Old Business was Ordinance #2016-13 - An Ordinance to Amend the Official Zoning Map of the Town of Brownsburg, Hendricks County, Indiana for Certain Real Estate Located at 213 N. Green St. - Proposed 2nd, 3rd Reading and Final Adoption (Todd Barker) This was approved.

Next was the change in the fireworks ordinance, Ordinance #2016-14 - An Ordinance of the Town Council of the Town of Brownsburg, Indiana Amending Title IX Chapter 92, Sections 92.060, 92.061, 92.062, 92.063 and Chapter 93, Section 93.52 of the Brownsburg Town Code - Proposed 2nd, 3rd Reading and Final Adoption (Brian Hartsell) This was approved and put into place for the July 4th holiday.

First under New Business was Ordinance #2016-15 - An Ordinance of the Town of Brownsburg, Hendricks County, Indiana, Adopting Uniform Internal Control Standards for an Indiana Political Subdivision Pursuant to Indiana Code- Proposed 1st, 2nd, 3rd Reading and Final Adoption (Ann Hathaway) Since only three council members were present this was changed to a 1st reading. This ordinance is the first step in adopting internal controls for the town. This is the baseline ordinance. As new policies are completed they will be added to the ordinance. The controls will help with the State Board of Accounts audits. This was approved.

Next up was the Preliminary Engineering Report, PER, dated June 2016, regarding the Brownsburg Wastewater Treatment Plant and Sanitary Sewer Collection System Improvements, as a requirement of the Application for a SRF (State Revolving Fund) Loan for a Municipal Water Pollution Control Project to Meet State and Federal Regulations, such as NPDES Discharge Limitations - Public Hearing (Kathy Dillon). This was an advertised public hearing.

Mr. Kleinhenz set the stage by stating this is just a Public Hearing for the Preliminary Engineering Report. They are not approving any money tonight. This is to get public comments on the report. The resolutions will come in the first Meeting in July to continue the SRF process. SRF priority list will be issued after July 1st. Troy Austin was the first person up for the public hearing. He was concerned that the public had not been involved. He asked the council to slow down, work the numbers and see if the town could do what the school system did and find a way to fund without increasing taxes. The other person to speak was Kevin Koontz. He noted what happened to Whittietown by waiting too long. He supported the issue because the plant was at 85%. He asked if the two phases could be separated so we could get the new rules covered and then the capacity. He realized this issue had been kicked down the curb from other councils but now it had to be done. The public hearing was closed with the promise of more public meetings on the issue.

Next up was Resolution #2016-22D - A Resolution ratification of the designation an Economic Revitalization Area and Qualifying Certain Real Property for Tax Abatement - Maplehurst Bakery, 50 Maplehurst Drive (Greg Anderson) Maplehurst is expanding the Brownsburg site and making it a corporate headquarters. The expansion is for 1.5 million and will bring in 15 corporate positions bringing the number of employees at the plant to 329. The resolution was approved.

Last under new business was Resolution #2016-23 - A Resolution of the Town Council of the Town of Brownsburg Approving an Additional Appropriation for the Purchase of Three New Fire Engine Trucks (Chief Larry Alcorn) purchase of three new pumpers. The Fire Territory thought they would need to finance but they found a way to pay cash out of their funds. The Fire Territory Executive Board has approved the purchase. This was an advertised public hearing but no one spoke.

The resolution was approved.

Under Town Manager items, Mr. Kleinhenz commented that the Farmers Market has expanded to almost 70 vendors when it started 5 years ago there was only 5 vendors. He also noted that Tilden road is within two weeks of being completed if the weather would cooperate.

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June BCSC Highlights - Anne Sering

The Board of Trustees for Brownsburg Community School Corporation met on June 13 with three members present: Adam Bower, Jessica Heffernan, and Phil Utterback. With this setup all motions are made by Utterback or Heffernan with Heffernan or Utterback seconding the motion. Also, with Kim Armstrong missing, the number of questions and comments are cut by almost half, leaving Utterback to ask the most questions and make the most comments. Last month, it was reported that Mr. Utterback took offense to the surprise announcement that a change in law would allow the Board to appoint a non-board member to be the Corporation's representative on the Town of Brownsburg Redevelopment Commission. He had volunteered for the position in 2015 and seemed to take offense at the adlib comments about who the Board might choose. This topic did not come up in this meeting so one can assume that Mr. Utterback will continue as the appointee.

Mr. Barry Gardner presented information on the 2017 Debt Service Plan and 2017-2019 Capital Project Plan. The bottom line is that the amount of debt will be dropping off over the next 10 years. Mr. Utterback seemed to surprise the administration with pointed questions about some budget items. It is apparent that one Board member studies and prepares for the meeting.

Mr. Voigt reported on preschool transportation fees, stating that 2/3 of the special education children took a bus to school and 1/2 of the tuition based students were transported. He also clarified that food service fees did go toward equipment replacement.

Mrs. Heffner reported on the surplus sale and Ford Drive 4 UR School. Both fund raisers will take place in September. She also restated that eight of the 32 scholarships for graduates were provided from staff payroll deductions.

Mrs. Gordon presented the first reading of the Support Staff Handbook. Included is the same catastrophic health care provision as has the teaching staff. It is commendable that all BCSC personnel is provided the same health care options.

Dr. Snapp presented the first reading of policy changes pertaining to students and the second reading and received approval of policy changes for Property and Operations. Unfortunately little information is presented during the meetings. It is only after the minutes are approved from the previous meeting that the details are provided for the public.

Five recommendations were approved. The public hearing on the high school project and the additional elementary school was approved as was the hearing for expansion of the Early Childhood Center. Also Preliminary Bond Resolution and a Declaration of Official Intent to Reimburse Expenditures as requested by Mr. Gardner were approved. The milk contract for the coming school year was approved (9.5 million milk cartons will be distributed to children in Brownsburg schools.) And CSO architecture fund was granted a Professional Services Agreement.

There will be no workshop in June. The next meeting in July will see the approval of the building plans. At the August meeting of the Board the enrollment figures for the 2016-2017 school year should be announced

June Park Board Highlights - Anne Sering

The Brownsburg Park Board met on June 16, 2016. Parking was limited because the Farmers Market was taking place. Those expecting a close parking place and not aware of the popularity of the market were in for a hike. Although Scott Latimer and Traci Morris were not present for the beginning of the meeting I expected for them to come in late. But parking must not have been the reason for their absence. Attendance at the Board meeting is generally only 2 or 3 people not there for a specific reason.

Kathy Dillon, Town of Brownsburg Superintendent of the Wastewater Department was present in the audience, so I scanned the agenda but saw nothing pertaining to Wastewater. When Director Phil Parnin announced that the New Business item (Rotary Partnership) would be addressed first, Kathy arose. President-elect Kathy Dillon was present to discuss the continuation of the partnership. The Brownsburg Rotary Club and the Brownsburg Parks have partnered to hold the second "Hops and Vines" fund raising event. The purpose of the partnership is to create a relationship between Brownsburg Parks and the Rotary Club to share resources and skills applied toward fundraising benefitting both parks and community projects. Last year's event funded the shade sails at the splash pad in Williams Park.

The Finance Committee is still in the process of separating BASE (before and after school enrichment program) from other expenses in order to better track the expenses of the ever-growing program.

Old business consisted of a lengthy report on the Organizational Assessment of the Park Department by PROS Consulting. The organization, formed in 1995, specializes in serving parks, recreation, and leisure industry. My opinion of the presentation was that much information was presented and as a casual observer without the printed report I struggled to digest it all. My conclusion was that the Park Department had more strengths than threats. The threats presented were what one familiar with the department would expect: a young staff, staff retention, and the growth factor. Technology management was a challenge for the administration. On the positive side, the management of the parks was highly rated with customer service a positive. Recreation was also rated good with citizen participation a positive. Suggestions included creating an employee manual and preparing for the future by keeping personnel needs in the forefront. It was also stated that best practices suggested the personnel costs be 55% to 60% of the budget. Brownsburg Parks is only 44% - 45%. One other deficiency related to personnel was that too frequently personnel had to take on responsibilities outside of their own job descriptions. In depth training for the staff is scheduled for June 30.

Asst. Director Travis Tranbarger reported that the Splash Pad had been repainted because chipping paint was causing problems in the water recycle system. The recent storms had affected electronics causing computer problems. Google maps had visited Williams Park and mapped some of the trails. (The June 25th issue of the Hendricks County Flyer had a front page article by Stephanie Dolan describing the filming of the Plainfield trail system. I am positive Brownsburg Parks participated in the 'Google Trekker' program before Plainfield. If you've ever had the opportunity to walk on a treadmill at HRC YMCA you may have been able to walk various trails around the United States.)

Director Philip Parnin reported on various trail projects. The trail to Avon spans 325 acres. The extension of the B&O with a parking lot and shelter with a board walk over wetlands will not start until 2017 and not 2016 as previously stated. A trail will also be established through the Cardinal Property to Airport Road. Drainage with pipes and culverts is slowing this project. A greater area than expected was declared a wetland. A new trail that goes under I74 from the Crew Property to Arbuckle Acres is also being planned. If one has walked on city streets one is aware of exactly how noisy traffic can be. These trails can provide a more conducive place to walk.

Troy Wymer Arrested

Troy Wymer, Wayne Township firefighter and former Brown Township trustee, was charged June 10, 2016 with theft and official misconduct. He served as the Brown Township Trustee from January 1, 2011 and December 31, 2014. According to the allegations, the current Brown Township Trustee reported to Indiana State Police that Wymer had withdrawn funds totaling \$9,739.50 which he paid back to Brown Township on his last day in office. Current township officials say they first noticed the error while reviewing records from the 2014 fiscal year.

The Wayne Township fire department placed him on leave until the conclusion of the charges.

In the event Mr Wymer is convicted of these charges, many in the community have shared with this publication their expectation at a minimum Brown Township Board Chairman John Gootee resignation should follow shortly thereafter, as the board chairman he is the person responsible who signed off on the accuracy of the Brown Township's financial records.

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Leminger Under Investigation

Following Nate Mantlo's (Brown Township Board member) May 26, 2016 speech; A speech which alleged Mrs. Leminger held two positions in a direct conflict of interest that being the attorney for the Town of Brownsburg and concurrently for the Brownsburg Fire Territory, as evidenced by her (alleged) actions this left the Brownsburg Fire Territory unprotected to fight off predatory legal actions taken by the Town of Brownsburg.

In June a group of concerned citizens contacted the Disciplinary Commission of the Indiana Supreme Court and requested a formal investigation into her conduct (see the front page of this publication dated May 30, 2016 for details of the citizens allegations).

This publication advocates for a thorough, swift and unbiased investigation, the results of which are based solely on the evidence and actions taken by Mrs. Leminger. The outcome (and any penalties if found guilty) of the investigation must be void of external or internal influences which may stand to benefit by altering the outcome one way or another beyond what her actions mandate.

This publication will publish the outcome of the investigation, if those results are made available to the public.

Terror Suspect Arrested



A former Brownsburg High School student Akram Musleh, 18, was arrested June 21, 2016 on federal terrorism charges after allegedly attempting to provide support to ISIS and travel overseas to join the terrorism organization.

Law enforcement officials said Akram attempted to board a bus departing Indianapolis to New York, where they said he planned to fly to Morocco on his way to territory controlled by ISIS. Court documents (available on our website) indicate his plans were to join the ISIS.

During Chief Dove's comments to Town Council June 23, 2016, the Chief indicated Akram had been under surveillance since a joint effort between the Brownsburg Community Schools and the Brownsburg Police Department identified him as a potential risk while still in high school. Once Akram began acting on his beliefs, the Brownsburg P.D. contacted the FBI.

Brownsburg P.D. has the honor or dubious distinction of being the first to capture a terrorist suspect in the Southern District of Indiana.

This publication will not allow the accused to gain any notoriety from his actions if found guilty; nor condemn him in the event he is found innocent of the charges. As a result we are withholding his picture.

Drew Storen Toronto Blue Jays, and Tucker Barnhart Cincinnati Reds. This publication will closely monitor the activities of all participants going forward. 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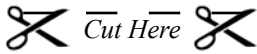
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
